Minister's Musings

This month I will share my musings with our Unitarian Universalist Association President, Peter Morales. Perhaps you have read his "hand in hand" message in the spring issue of *UU World*. Certainly, it is worthy of reflection and discussion.

According to President Morales' definition, UUCE is an 'it' church. See if you don't agree:

"Some congregations are full of life. The energy fills the room. The warmth is palpable. We feel it in worship. We sense it in coffee hour. There is something about the "buzz." We see people smile and embrace. They engage one another."

Yes! We have it! Warmth, worship, engagement! Morales continues by noting that he thinks that the difference between an "it" church and one that is not, is RELIGION. We need to all "get religion." He believes that what ties us together, what makes us a religion is not

necessarily best described by our belief statements, but what ties us together is what we love, what we truly care about.

Morales makes an insightful comparison. When we talk about beliefs, we often try to justify them and often end up arguing about them. However, when we ask each other what we care about, we don't argue; we listen. We see our communalities, our shared vision, and we are energized. This is "getting religion."

At UUCE we are steeped in discussions of what we care about, what we want to see happen in this community and this world. We continually ask, "What can I do?" "What can we do?" These are religious questions. Born out of love they are the foundation of the temple we build together. It is a temple of concern and compassion, being built by justice seeking people. It is not just what we say or even what we do; it is who we are.

Our outward display of compassion does not come intuitively. It is a product of hard work, of decisions communally made. These are religious decisions, - decisions based on our core values, decisions which express ideals which are important to us. This work should not be taken lightly. It is not simply something to do together, not a joint, meritless project. When we decide to act, we are acting out of love and reason, promoting justice and fairness. Let us realize, let us accept, let us affirm its religious nature. When we act together, we are living our values. This is a good thing. May we continue to absorb ourselves in relevant questions, carefully considered so that we might move mountains of injustice and glean the emergence of the Beloved Community.

May it be so, Rev Deane


Join us on the 1st, 3rd and 5th Sundays before service at 8:45 for the Adult Discussion Group. This month we will be discussing stereotypes.
