Blessings in this time of change, Rev Deane


Join Us for Fun on the Water

Letter from the President-elect

Dear UUCE'rs,

This has been quite the month. The highs and lows associated with my involvement in our church have been as wild as the weather.

Ms. Sandra, our consultant, did a wonderful job of gathering a lot of information and relating that information to us in a way that seemed very relevant and certainly timely. Our board meeting was very fruitful with a large assignment from Ms. Sandra for us to accomplish, along with all of the other workings of our church. We, the board are convening again next Monday, the 25th of April, to report back on our respective assignments.

As your President Elect, I am tasked with being the chair of the church council. I took on the projects that directly related to church council. One of those was to facilitate a meeting to look at our Religious Education (RE) program. I emailed all of the people I could think of that either had children in our RE program, were current and/or past teachers, and/or was an RE director in the past.

We met on Wednesday the 20th of April. In attendance were Rev. Deane, Susie Feinberg, Jack Carden and myself. There were some good ideas put forth such as splitting up the year for our volunteer teachers, hiring a paid teacher, and many others. I received emails from some of the invitees that couldn't attend, offering ideas for our current situation and thoughts about where we go from here.

Rev. Deane lead us in an exercise that, in the end, pointed out how few people we have that can fill the role of an RE teacher or director. It seems to me that we have a very high burnout rate with our RE teacher/director volunteers.

Our church, through it's RE program, has had and continues to have huge impacts on the lives of the children in our congregation. Currently we have 3 wonderful, bright, and caring ladies that carry the load. Almost every Sunday they traipse out of our sanctuary to offer our youth a vision of the world that can be found

no other place (unless they are fortunate enough to be the child of one of these gifted three). In the past, as I recall, we get to the start of another teaching season and we enter into crisis mode to find someone to devote part of their lives to our kids, and someone has always stepped up. Not the best way to run a railroad but, at least, until now, it has worked. Let's all hope that it continues to.

Through all of this I have repeatedly asked others and myself "what is our common thread?" One of our board members offered what I think is a brilliant observation. He thinks the common thread is that we are all on a quest, a quest to continuously search for our own "truths". I agree with him. I think that's what the common thread seems to be. If that is the case for you, as it is for me, then I look forward to the journey with you.

Endowment Funds Considerations

The Stewardship Committee has begun the process of planning for our next Annual Budget Drive which includes a proposed budget for next fiscal year which begins in July. In examining our expected expenses and planning our proposed budget, we have included expenses related to the monies that we have borrowed from our endowment fund.

Some members have asked about our endowment fund – where did it come from and why is it important to begin to pay back the amounts we have borrowed since FY 2007-08? Members have every right to understand our endowment fund, how it works and why it is important to honor our commitments to those members who made the contributions in the first place. As past chair of the Stewardship Committee and as your Treasurer-Elect on the board of directors, I have researched the subject and offer this attempt to answer some of these questions.

Let us first consider this section of our Church Fiscal Policy document: Section IV: The Endowment Fund A. The purpose of the Endowment Fund is to receive, hold, manage, and invest gifts, such as money, stocks, bonds, and property. These gifts derive from bequests, legacies, wills, trusts, and special gifts from friends or members of the congregation.

B. The value of the Endowment Fund at any time is defined as the total of our entire investment holdings value, minus the other funds within the investments account. Fluctuation of market value of investment vehicles (i.e. stocks, bonds, cash, etc.) are reflected in the value of the Endowment Fund.

C. The Endowment Fund principal is permanently held. Only its income is used (for general operating expenses). Withdrawals from the principal can be made only if the Congregation votes to do so in order to meet some very special need or to resolve some dire problem. A 2/3 majority of the members

attending a special meeting of the Congregation would be required. These limitations regarding the withdrawal of funds are intended to assure donors that their gifts to the Endowment Fund will be retained for the long-term benefit and financial stability of the church. D. In the event that institutional Unitarian Universalism ceases to be a viable reality in metropolitan Evansville, serious consideration should be made by the congregation to give the Endowment Fund assets to the Unitarian Universalist Association without restriction. The Endowment Fund represents the aggregation of many gifts from those who have supported our congregation here in Evansville. Their generosity has allowed us to acquire the properties on Morgan Ave, including the Chalice House and to establish the fund which in the past has held significant investments that were designed to supplement the budget and support the programs offered by the church.

Why is this important? The Endowment Fund has enabled us to attract our current minister. Without that fund, we would never have interested any professional minister in considering our "offer" since it would have been significantly below the minimum compensation recommended by the UUA. And, I believe, without a significant Endowment Fund to back up our next offer (whatever that might be,) we will have an extremely difficult time convincing any professional ministerial candidate to take us seriously. As many of you know firsthand, the current "economic hard times" has forced many people to resort to using their savings to survive. Without this important cushion, UUCE will have a very difficult time surviving the next few years.

In July 2007, the congregation voted to authorize borrowing from the endowment fund in order to be able to afford to hire a second interim minister. Since that time we have borrowed each year and, with the exception of FY 2008

-09, we have not even paid back the interest to which the endowment fund is entitled. Our total debt to the endowment fund is projected to be \$57,424 as of the end of June this year and the endowment fund is projected to be depleted to about \$12,416.

As we plan for next year's budget, it is not reasonable to continue to ignore this debt that we owe to ourselves. The past gifts were made to help insure the long-term prosperity of the church. As one of the financial stewards of the church, I cannot support the continued use of these funds to support the short term objectives of our budgetary needs. The proposed budget for next fiscal year will contain two line items relating to the endowment fund borrowing: interest at 4% for the next fiscal year on the money we already owe to the fund and an installment payment which when completed will allow us to repay the fund over the course of the next 13 years. (The original plan was to repay the loan over 15 years, but that was two

If we don't commit to repaying our endowment now, when will we be able to commit to repay our "debt" to ourselves?

This note may not have addressed your specific concerns. If it has not, please let me know and allow me the chance to respond to your additional questions regarding the endowment borrowing and our need to address it in our next fiscal year's budget.
