WHO ARE THE VISITING MINISTERS?

In the Spring of 2012, in order to provide variety, enhance the quality of our Sunday morning services, give some relief to the hardworking members of the Worship Committee, and stay in touch with the larger UU community, Tom, Ed, Linda Sue, Marla, and Karim decided to invite UU ministers from nearby Communities to preach at UUCE.

Their goal is to have at least one visiting minister each month. Their budget includes travel funds to accommodate the idea. To make the visiting ministers feel welcome and to give us a chance to visit with them, a potluck will be scheduled each time they are with us.

After working with Lisa Presley at the Heartland District office, Linda Sue secured the names of several likely candidates. Some were not available; some were not interested. But four were willing to journey to Evansville and preach to us on specified Sundays.

They were the Rev. Forrest Gilmore from Bloom-

ington (July 29th), the Rev. Doddie Stone from Terre Haute (June 24th and August 26th), the Rev. Julie Denny-Hughes from Indianapolis (Sept. 23rd) and the Rev. Bill Gupton from Cincinnati (Sept. 30th). Looking to future Sundays, the Committee has a promise from Doddie Stone to preach at UUCE on October 21st and again on November 25th.

Forrest Gilmore, from Bloomington, while trained & educated as a UU minister, is no longer in the ministry, but has opted instead to work to end homelessness in his community, much like Aurora has yowed to do in

Evansville.

Julie Denny-Hughes served in churches in Richmond, Virginia; Raleigh, North Carolina; Palatine, Illinois; and Halifax, Nova Scotia, before retiring in 2010 and returning to Indiana, her home state, to "dote on grandchildren". She has degrees from the University of Illinois and Meadville Lombard Theological School.

Bill Gupton is a UU minis-

ter and certified yoga teacher based in Cincinnati, Ohio. On his website, he states "Yoga is both a physical and spiritual practice. By working toward the optimal alignment of our bodies we are also seeking to 'align with the divine' in order to both experience and express the Spirit of Life in our poses. These two Traditions...affirm the inherent goodness and divine nature in every person."

Doddie Stone came to the ministry after a career in teaching. She is a graduate of Evansville College (now UofE). When she retired from teaching on the west coast, she decided to become a minister and went to Starr King Theological Seminary for a divinity degree. After serving several years as a UU minister, she retired once again, and settled in Terre Haute where she affiliated with the congregation there. She filled in as their minister until they were able to hire a permanent replacement for

What it takes to keep us running

As you sit in church on a Sunday morning, enjoying the music, the readings, the sermon, the air-conditioning, the "free" post-service coffee & goodies, and the fellowship, you probably don't think about the effort that makes it possible - that is unless you were responsible for some part of it. If so, you know it doesn't just happen.

Countless acts take place to make the Service meaningful. In preparation for each Sunday, someone had to plan the service, print the order of service, and conduct it. Other members performed menial but no less important acts. They mowed the grass, posted the topic on the outdoor sign, put out the flags, made sure there was oil in the chalice, put water in the joys & sorrows bowl, brought flowers for the table, made the coffee, checked the comfort level of the sanctuary, paid the utility bills, saw that we have child care every Sunday and scheduled the greeters. During the course of the year, standing & ad hoc committees are responsible for publicizing our services, raising the funds needed to support our budget, responding to the needs of ill and incapacitated members, volunteering at our Fall Festival Booth, our annual yard sale, Patchwork Central, and the United Caring shelter.

We can be proud of what I've listed. But what concerns me it that for the most part it is the work of dedicated volunteers who are too few in number. It is apparent that some of our members feel they have met their obligation to UUCE by contributing to our financial well being. They are content to let the same small band of volun-

teers do the work of the Church.

We are a small congregation, so when you are asked to serve, just say YES.
